Anti-Human Trafficking

ACASA, along with staff from ACADV, worked with the OVC HT Capacity Building Center to enhance ACADV and ACASA's capacity to provide sustainable assistance to all survivors of trafficking. As a result of this collaborative coaching process, ACADV and ACASA developed a coalition collaboration model and are currently planning a curriculum for the coalitions to use in a coordinated way for training their respective staff. We have also started surveys and regional mapping of gaps between survivors' needs and the re-forming of a statewide advisory group.

Crisis Center Spotlight Family Crisis Center of Northeast Arkansas

Since opening the Rape Crisis Center in 2017, we have become accustomed to fairly consistent change as we grow and seek new ways to improve services for our clients and our community. While all crisis centers maintain a certain level of preparedness, 2020 was a year that no one could have anticipated. Protocols, policies, and standards that had been established since inception were now facing changes on a daily basis as we learned from new information and the experiences of other agencies. The constant question we posed to ourselves: How can we use this information to ensure the ongoing safety of our clients and staff, without any loss to the quality of care and services we provide?

With hospitals overwhelmed, many organizations were forced to alter their operations, and with uncertainty rising, we chose to increase communications within our community and to all of our partners. This led to both an immediate and sustained increase in the number of forensic exams completed by our agency throughout 2020. In addition, we saw an overall increase in the community's awareness of our agency and the topic of sexual assault as a whole.
There were additional protective measures put into place, such as PPE, to keep both our clients, as well as our staff, as safe as possible. Ultimately, we had to work toward an even greater level of preparedness than we had known before. Many of our processes had to adapt to the availability of our vendors and community supports.

Heading into 2021, we greatly look forward to maintaining the increased strength of our community partnerships as well as the opportunity to return to our regularly scheduled community events when it's safe to do so. We plan to continue learning new and better ways to express our care and compassion for our clients and each other as we move through these uncertain times, where tried and true methods may not always be available.
